

Floating Rafts - Community Engagement Summary

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1 Overview

Community engagement for Swimming Rafts in the Shire opened on July 27, closing on 14 August 2016.

2 Background

The purpose of this community engagement project was to understand what the community priorities and concerns are for the deployment of swimming rafts in the Shire.

At the Council meeting on 11 November 2015 Council resolved to undertake community consultation regarding the provision of swimming rafts.

Swimming rafts, or pontoons, are flat buoyant structures usually made of a plastic or fibreglass floating platform. They can be installed in the ocean like at Gnarabup and Gracetown, or in rivers like near Molloy Island. The use of professionally built rafts in the Shire can have wide ranging benefits for users including increased physical, emotional and psychological health. The use and location of swimming rafts must be well considered, to minimise impact on the environment and residents in these social spaces.

3 Engagement summary

The aim was to keep this community engagement local, informal and simple in approach, and include a combination of public notices and online activities.

3.1.1 Public notices

This community engagement was communicated to the public in the following ways:

- A public notice was provided in the Community Consultation section of the Margaret River Times on Friday 29 July, 5 and 12 August.
- Posters of the community engagement were positioned in the Margaret River and Augusta Shire offices and libraries.

3.1.2 Online and hard copy surveys

The online tool had an online survey and mapping features activated. The overall response to the survey this page was very positive with 42 online responses and 5 hard copies completed.

A second online tool, interactive mapping was also available with the community able to place markers at locations they believed were suitable for floating rafts.

The landing page for the project featured a short blurb with some photos and the featured survey, and was featured on the homepage when engagement commenced.


At the Council meeting on 11 November 2015 Council resolved to undertake community consultation regarding the provision of swimming rafts. These minutes can be viewed here.

The project page attracted 203 individual page views, peaking on the 07th August with 34 views.





4 Online Engagement Findings

At the conclusion of the community engagement the Shire received 42 online submissions and 5 hardcopy submissions.


A summary of the survey results is provided at Appendix B, with the findings of the consultation discussed further below. The hard copy responses were manually entered into an excel spreadsheet containing the online submissions.

5 Key Outcomes

The online and physical submissions were analysed and are presented below.




5.1.1 Shire of Augusta Margaret River



There was strong general support for the use of swimming rafts in the Shire as a whole, with support for the activity as it encourages people to exercise in a fun and healthy way. Concerns included safety due to murky water or unknown obstacles and potential impact on amenity or the environment.

5.1.2 The Margaret River




Respondents identified that the Margaret River as a whole was close to town and rafts in general provided opportunities for fun exercise and recreation.

Opposition included safety concerns, impact on the environment (erosion, fauna and flora) and amenity of surrounding residents and general users who use the area.




5.1.3 Blackwood River or Hardy Inlet



There was general support for rafts in the Blackwood River and Hardy Inlet. Less concern was raised regarding potential environmental impact, with sandy beaches and greater infrastructure to provide access. Safety concerns were lower due to clearer water, and greater tidal influence providing greater visibility and buoyancy.

5.1.4 Barrett Street Weir, Margaret River




Support for this site included more suitable infrastructure than other locations, and less impact on amenity.

Concerns included inadequate infrastructure such as toilets, bins, parking, and inadequate supervision (lifesaving, rangers).

Opposition included safety concerns, impact on amenity, erosion and water quality concerns.



5.1.5 Old Swimming Hole near Carters Rd Margaret River




Support for this site included less impact on amenity, and is close to town.

Concerns included inadequate infrastructure such as toilets, bins, parking, inadequate supervision (lifesaving, rangers).

Opposition included safety concerns, impact on amenity, erosion and water quality concerns.


5.1.6 Rendall Close weir, Margaret River)



This was the one location that had less than 50% support, with significant concern and opposition due to lack of infrastructure, impact on amenity, safety concerns and environmental (erosion and water quality).


Support for this site was general in nature and not strongly site specific.

5.1.7 Hardy Inlet near Turner Caravan Park



Strong support was shown for this site with main concerns relating to distance from potential users. There was strong support due to the presence of infrastructure such as toilets and parking and high numbers of potential users at the Caravan Park and surrounds. Safety and environmental concerns were considered less of an issue at this site due to water clarity and riverbank form.

5.1.8 Flinders Bay



Strong support was shown for this site with main concerns relating to distance from potential users. There was strong support due to the presence of infrastructure such as toilets and parking. It was raised by a number of submitters that a raft was previously located here. Safety concerns were highlighted by some respondents suggesting water depth would be insufficient. Some submitters stated that the potential demographic could conflict with existing users.



It is also noted that in recent community consultation regarding the development of the Flinders Bay Masterplan there was 100% support (four unsolicited submissions) regarding installation of a swim pontoon.

5.1.9 Please tell us of any other locations you think are suitable and why.

A number of respondents suggested retaining or expanding the existing rafts at Gnarabup and Gracetown. Other locations suggested included Chapman Pool, Alexandra Bridge, Riflebutts Beach, Cosy Corner, Hamelin Bay and Disneyland. Of these sites, only Alexandra Bridge and Rifflebuts Beach are managed by the Shire. Alexandra Bridge presents some of the same constraints as sites within the Margaret River and has additional issues such as high levels of boat traffic. Riflebutts could potentially be suitable, subject to a detailed site investigation.

5.1.10 Other Matters

There was an additional tool available online for respondents to drag a marker onto a dynamic map to show possible locations for floating rafts. Unfortunately, this tool was very poorly used, with only two people viewing the page and no responses received.

6 Next steps

Officers will prepare a report to Council summarising the public submissions and outcomes.

- It is recommended that rafts are not suitable for the Margaret River, with the possible exception of Barrett St weir due to safety, amenity and environmental impact concerns.
- It is recommended that further site analysis, including a full risk assessment is undertaken at Flinders Bay and the Hardy Inlet near Turner Caravan Park.
- It is recommended that at this point in time, detailed site investigations are not undertaken at any sites in the Margaret River.
- If additional rafts are made available, consideration is given to ocean based sites such as Gracetown, Gnarabup or Riflebutts rather than within the Margaret River due to environmental, social and safety concerns.

The use and location of swimming rafts must be well considered, to minimise impact on the environment and residents in these social spaces.

The following conditions should be considered:

- 1. Sites must contain relatively clear water and be at least 3.2m deep with that depth extending for at least 4.5m surrounding the platform
- 2. Relatively flat water for the safe installation and use of the raft
- 3. Traffic and parking
- 4. Public facilities available like toilets
- 5. Noise and amenity issues
- 6. Water quality requirements for public safety
- 7. Supervision requirements including passive surveillance for crime or vandalism
- 8. Impacts to water quality, native vegetation and river banks
